Motivation	Every year, schools around the world celebrate Dr. Seuss. Let's look more into why. Let's look at why his books are special.	"The Internet can be a dangerous place. Before we learn about looking up information [independently] on the computer, today we are going to discuss how to be safe when using the computer and when on the Internet. For our last research project, your sources were given to you. On the next project, you will be responsible for finding your own sources; therefore, it is important that you listen closely to today's information so that our computers won't be harmed and so that you will be safe."

Students think of a new type of animal/creature (can be inspired by Dr. Seuss - funny, weird, and colorful); complete <i>Oh</i>, <i>The Thinks You Can Think!</i> graphic organizer (show example) 5. 2nd Grade Only: Using the graphic organizer, write about this invented creature. 6.
